Lent and the whole "Repentance Thing"

For most modern-day Christians, Lent is considered a solemn time involving prayer, reflection, scripture reading and repentance. Having gotten all of our vices (including pancakes) out of our system the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, we enter the period before Easter in solemn contemplation, perhaps helped along by a dose of physical deprivation. There is no question that taking the time to come candidly before our creator in confessional prayer and worship is a wonderfully cleansing experience and can serve as a needed "reset" to our relationship with our Lord.

But if we go back and look closely at the word "repentance" we find a history and tradition that might offer more and expansive opportunities to enrich our relationship with our Lord and with each other as well.

The Hebrew word for repentance is "teshuva" and the Greek word is "metanoia."

Our theological forefather, John Calvin, pointed to the double derivation of the Hebrew and Greek words for "repentance": the Hebrew derives from conversion, or turning again, and the Greek means a change of mind and purpose.

I love the idea of "turning again" or "turning around" and a "change of mind and purpose" carries more meaning for me than does mere lamentation and self-reproach.

If we take the Hebrew and the Greek meanings to heart, we see "repentance" as an opportunity to grow in our faith and explore new and different ways of knowing Jesus, new and different ways of living our discipleship and new and different ways of living together as the body of Christ.

Lent need not be limited to atonement for things past but can and should provide an opportunity to explore new faith frontiers. With open hearts and minds we can use this Lenten time to stretch our faith lives by listening to different voices, discovering new methods of prayer, or reading texts we might not ordinarily read. Perhaps we tackle a book of the Bible we have not read before or that we find difficult or confusing. I have embarked on a Lenten study of the book of Job.

I have always held the belief that faith is a muscle which needs a little poking, prodding and exercise lest it atrophy and become useless. And, while there is nothing wrong with travelling the straight and narrow path, "turning around" every so often can yield delightful and surprising results and might just give us all a new sense of purpose.

Mission and Outreach Committee

This is a report of some recent gifts we will soon make using the monies **(\$11,000** total) set aside late last year for local agencies. This resulted in an increase of our "Outreach 2023" from less than 6% of the total budget to about 8%. Our 2024 budget plans are to "Outreach" 8.6% of the total budget with a goal of reaching 10% in 2026 of that total FPCN budget.

The local agencies that each will receive **\$2,200** are:

Newark Empowerment Center via the Wilmington based Friendship House - This organization among other

activities is responsible for the homeless community's Code Purple (Cold Night) program and is housed in the Newark's Main Street United Methodist Church and interacts with the folks in that community daily.

<u>Newark Area Welfare Committee</u> – They are predominantly known for the Christmas food distributions from FPC-N's Memorial Hall-West.

Meeting Ground – An Elkton Maryland based agency helping those in need their area.

Habitat for Humanity – Is a well-known agency based in New Castle County Delaware.

Support.Transformation. for Advancement. of Refugees. [S.T.A.R.] – This relatively new non-profit organization provides assistance and support for all immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers through legal representation, advocacy, social services, and counseling services.



In addition to supporting our local neighbors we plan to send \$4,000 of budget 2024 funds to our sister church in Dinanga in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The school currently has school tuition and state test financial needs. The general church has also has needs related to heavy rains and erosion in the area. This year will be the 35th anniversary of the Dinanga parish and the 11th anniversary of the parish school FPC-N helped build.

Lastly we decided to provide \$280 to support the Presbyterian Women's - Little Food Pantry that has been established; detail on this pantry is provided in a preceding page of this Heartbeat. These monies were donated by our church membership at Christmas time, in lieu of Christmas Flowers – Poinsettias. This **Local Mission** purpose was selected in our most recent meeting.
